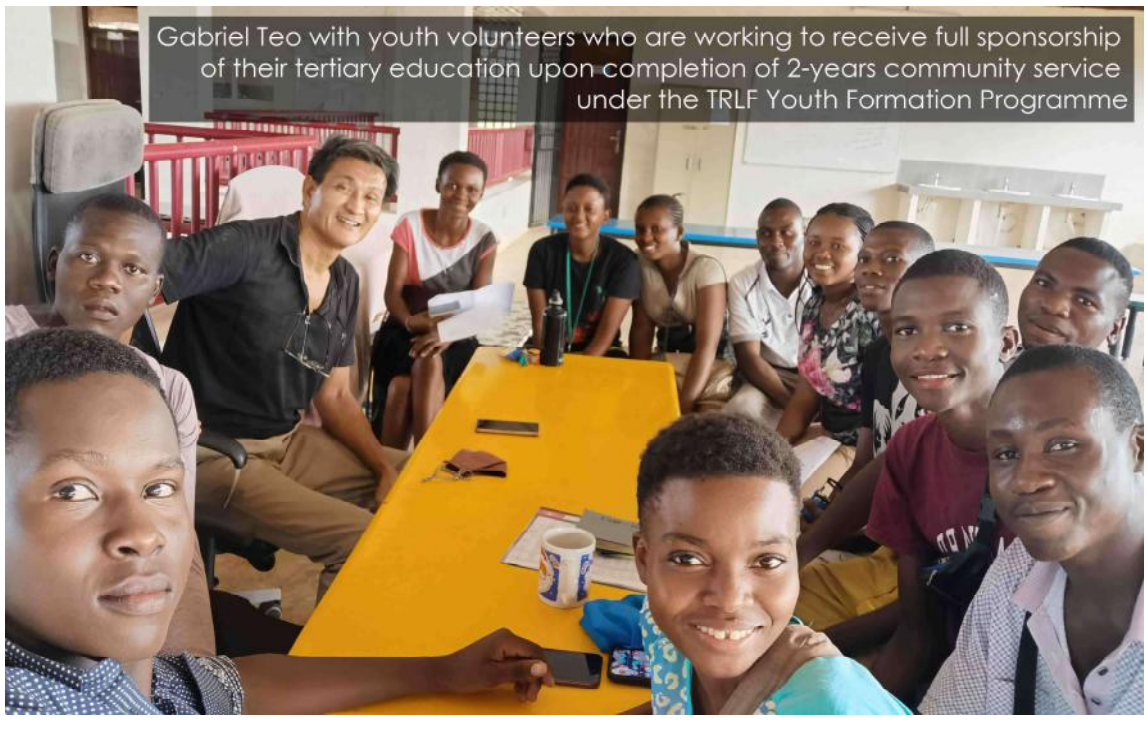

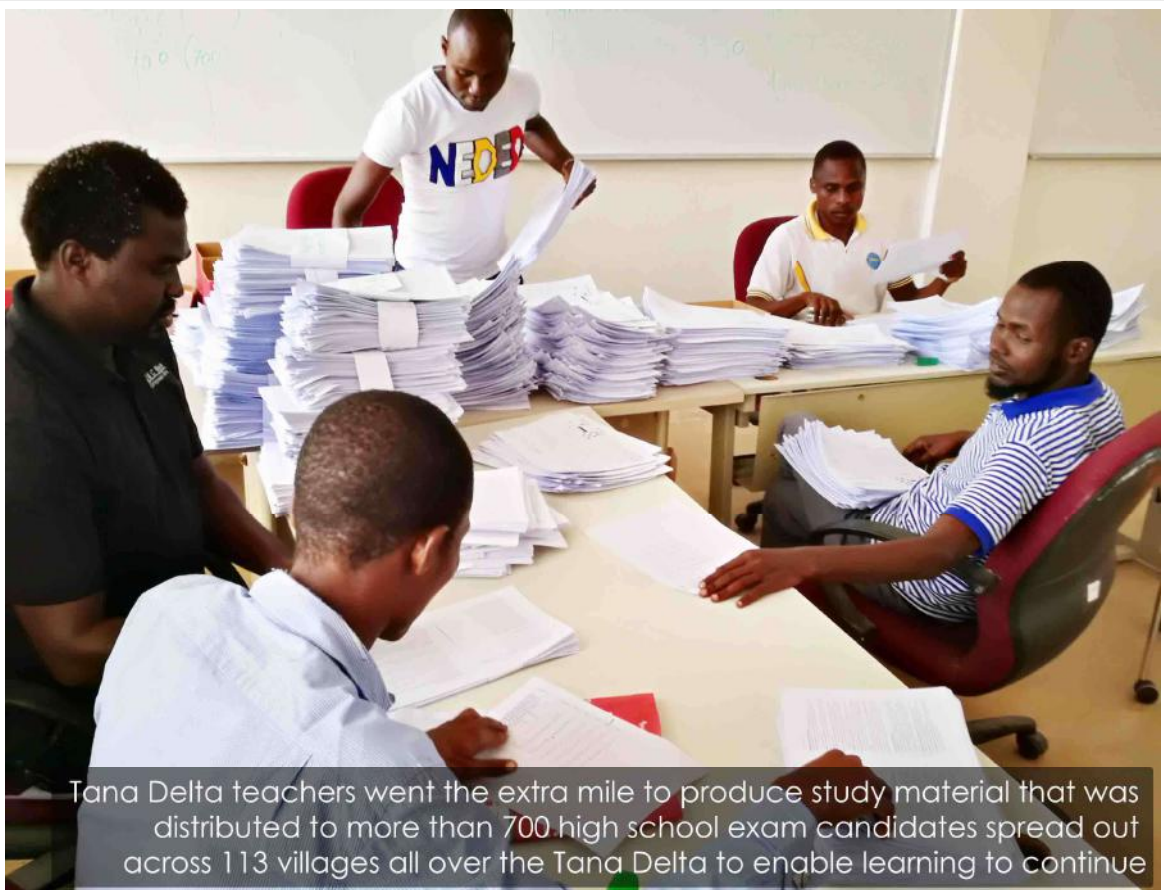

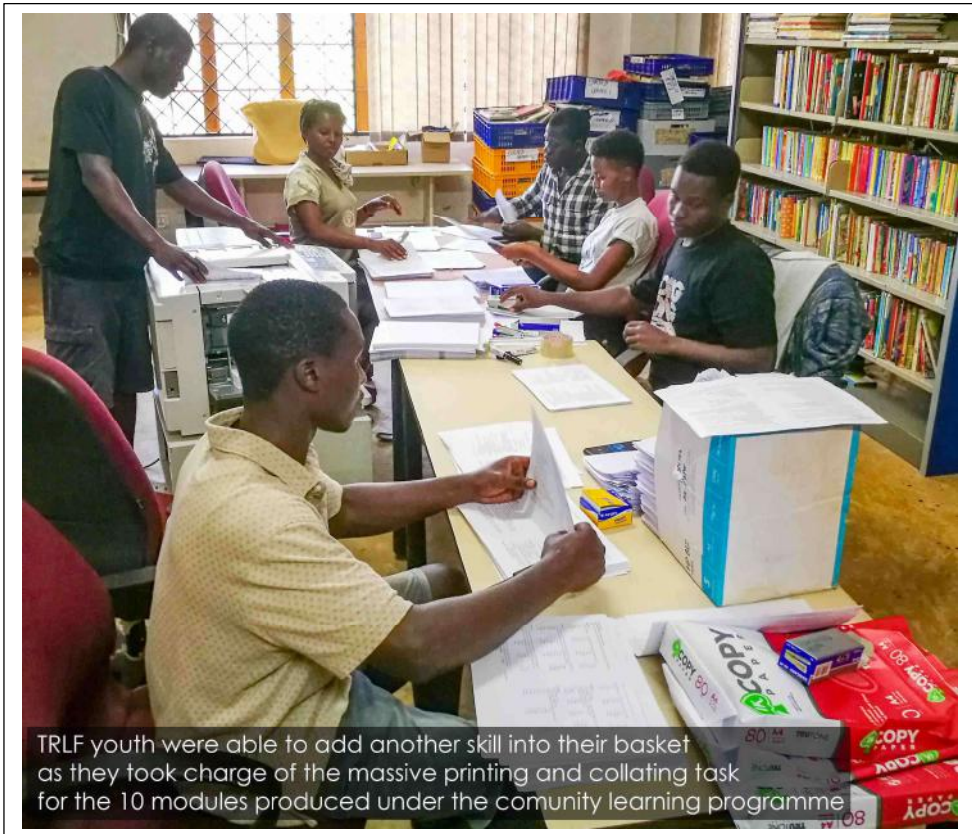
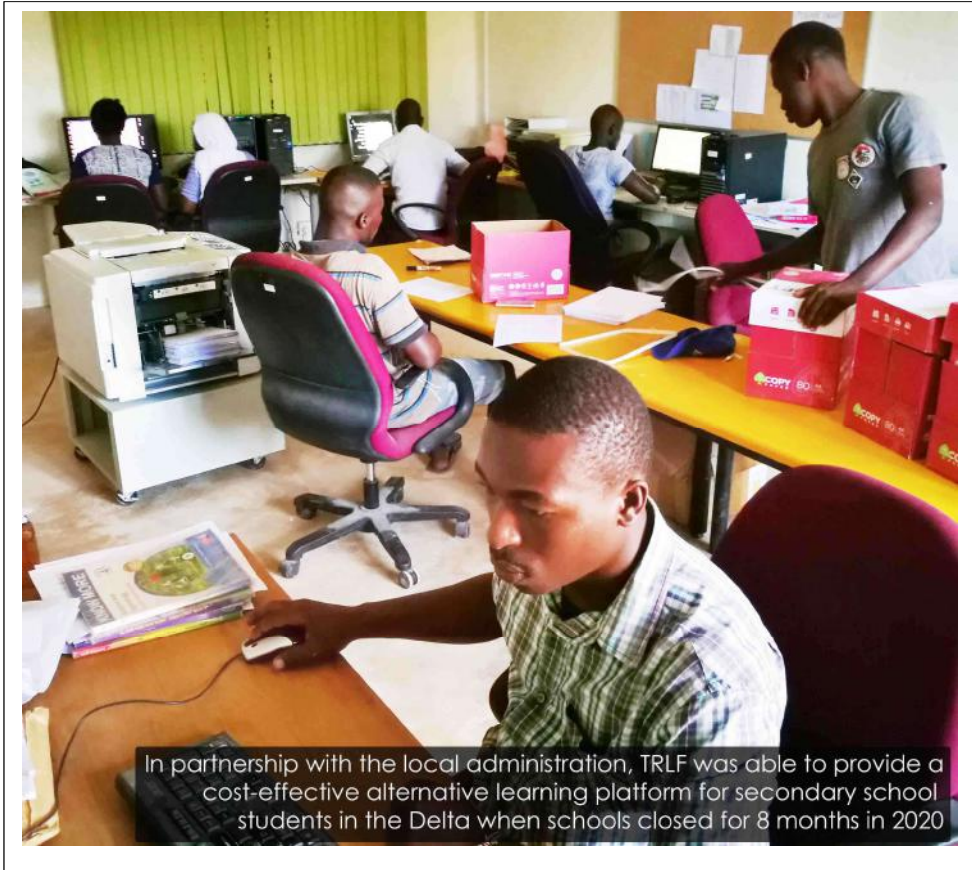




Bandi village was completely inundated during the massive floods that caused much destruction across the Tana Delta in March 2020

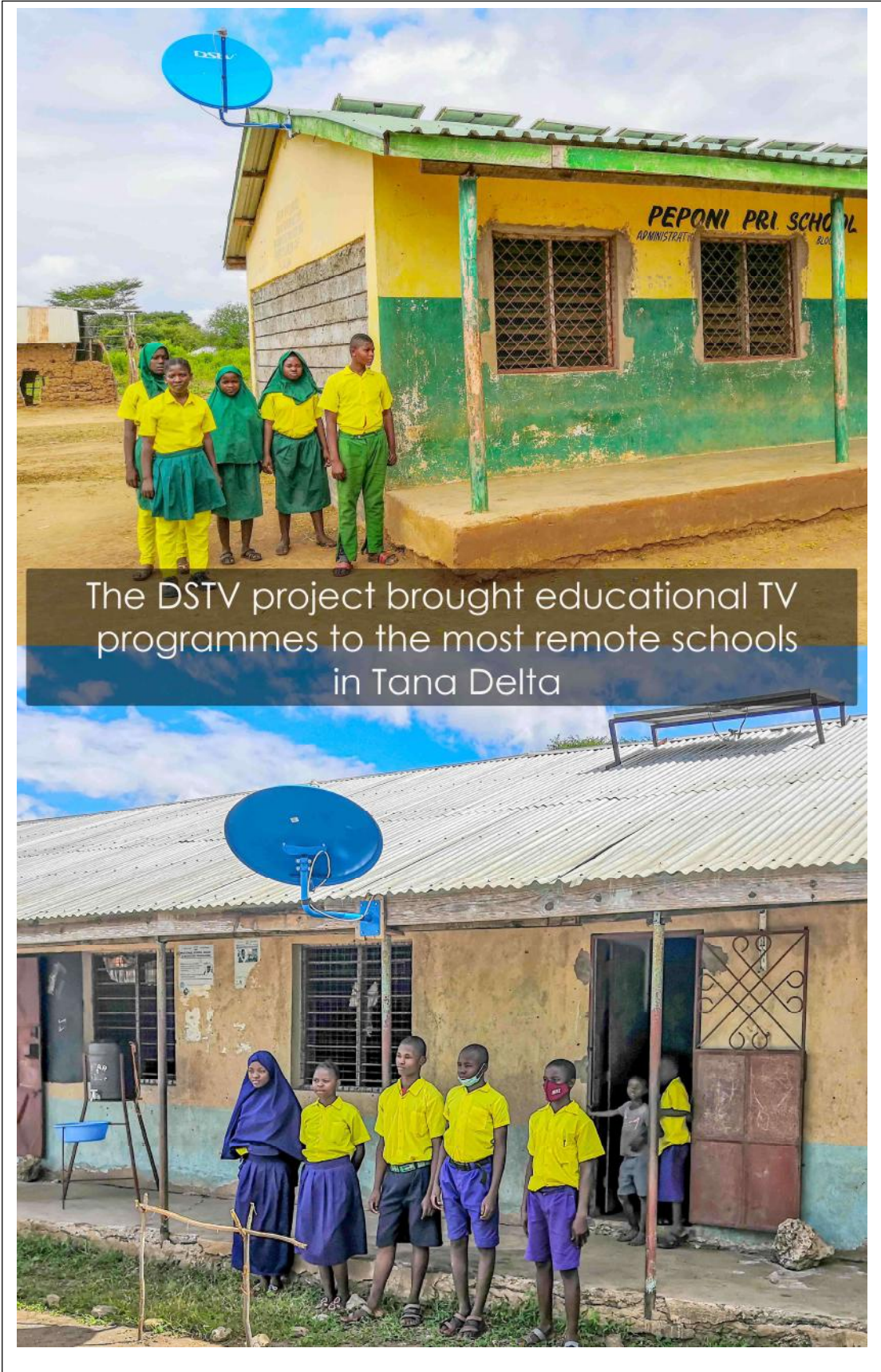

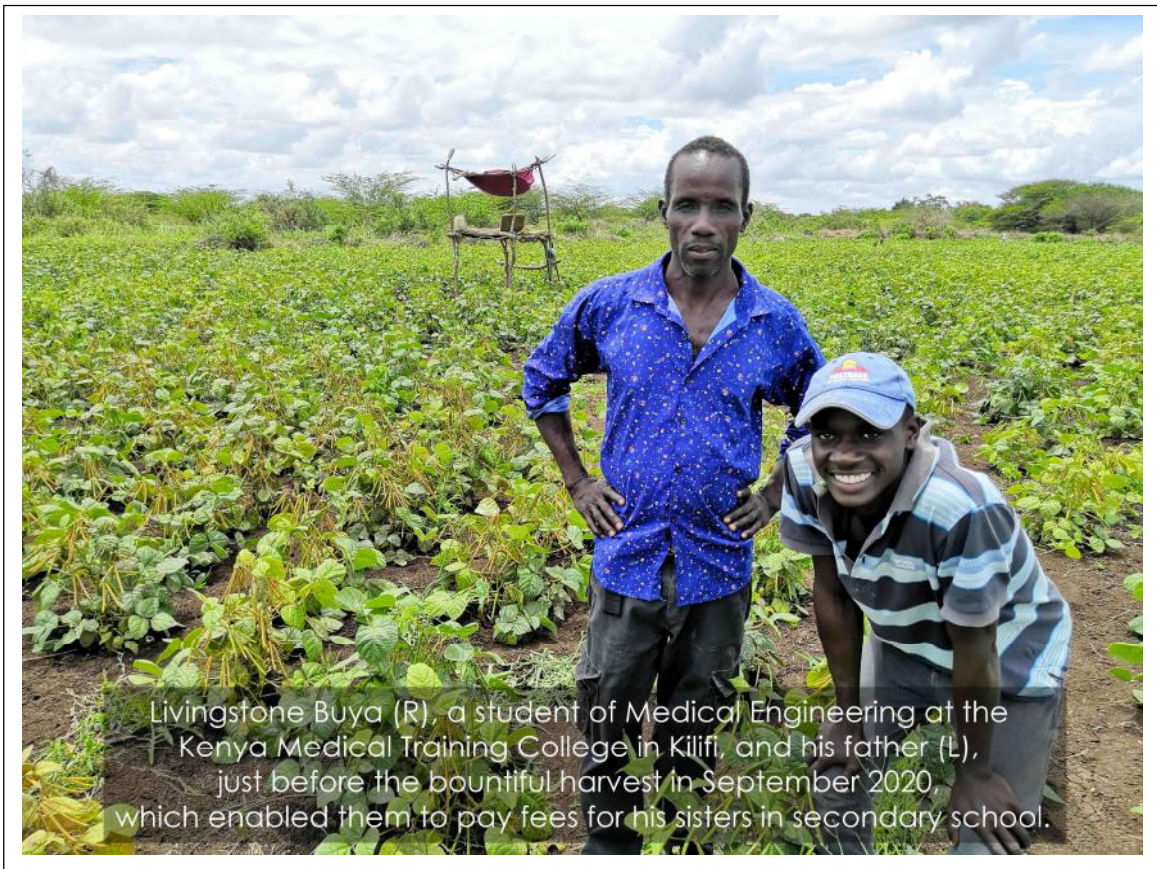
Students under the SSP-ESP at the entrance of Portuguese Fort Jesus in Mombasa. Their learning is holistic and takes place both in and out of the classroom

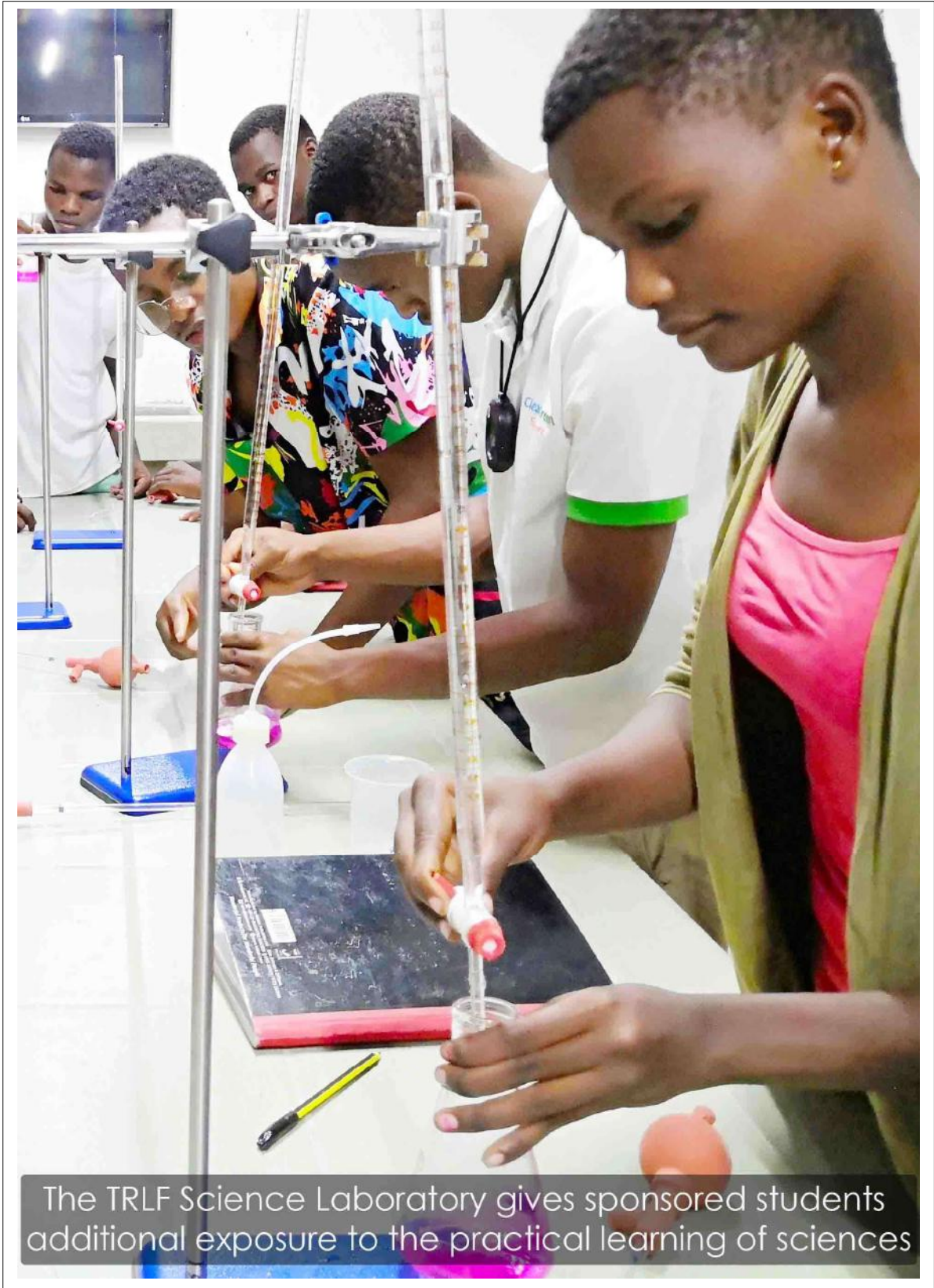

At DEMSA, we harnessed the extended school closure in 2020 to train our teachers to be computer proficient, and revamp our approach to teaching and testing our students



30% of children enrolled at DEMSA are from families of the lowest income group, and pay very low fees. This is made possible by the three-tier fee structure employed at DEMSA that enables cross-subsidy between the different tiers



The TRLF Science Laboratory gives sponsored students additional exposure to the practical learning of sciences



The massive floods in March 2020 that swept many parts of the Tana Delta left in its wake much destruction, losses and hunger for the local communities. But it also gave rise to the TRLF Quality Seed Programme which with the sweat of farmers across Tana Delta, resulted in food security and disposable farm income for many families in the later part of the year...

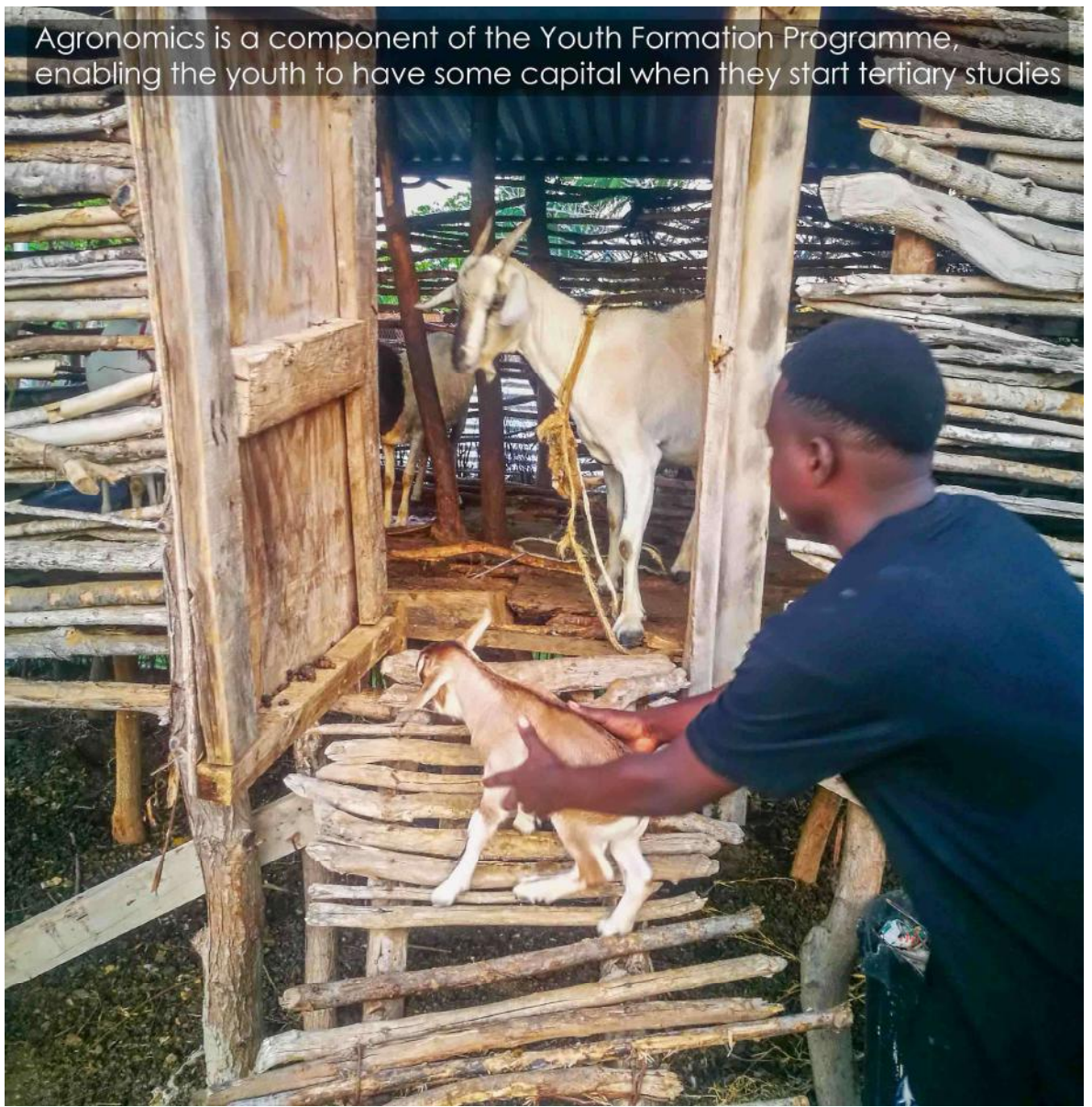


We teach our youth about sustainability, financial, social and also environmental sustainability
